Brenda Farm and Ken Sandy have been volunteers at the shelter for the past two years. Brenda gives nicknames to all the kitties and talks with them while cleaning



He spent four years being passed over for 'normal' kitties, then one day Scott came to the shelter. "I wasn't really looking to adopt a cat, but he was just so sweet, and I thought it was so sad that no one wanted him. It wasn't love at first sight, but after a few visits I knew what I had to do." Once Scott adopted O'Malley and got him home his behavior changed dramatically. "He started to act just like a regular cat. He loves running and jumping around the house, and he's quite vocal. He's such a smart cat, he knows his name and comes when I call him. He even has his own special bed." When you go to adopt, don't overlook the 'different' ones. They need love and a good home too, and you may just get a big surprise.





If you are not a follower on our Facebook page you may not be aware that Heartland has a GoFundMe page. The shelter is in need of repairs and replacement of items, and it is important that we raise money for these improvements.

The money raised to build the shelter only allowed a small building. Having outgrown the original building an addition was built to be used mainly for storage. We have tried to use part of the addition for an Isolation Room for incoming or sick cats. There is no heat or A/C in the addition, and during extreme weather cats can not be housed in isolation. One of the main items needed with GoFundMe money will be HVAC for the addition as well as new cages.

We are very thankful for our donors and friends for supporting us in the past, and we are hopeful the support will remain. We ask that you share our GoFundMe page with your friends and hopefully we will get the funds needed to upgrade our facility. The goal is to have a more comfortable building that can house more cats. After all, the more cats we can help.

While HPW was able for find furever homes for 95 cats and kittens in 2018, we had to turn away close to 300 homeless cats. This was due primarily to funding and lack of housing space.
