


"FREE" Kittens

You have probably seen these words on a poster or in the newspaper. There is no such thing as a free kitten if you take care of it.

The "free" kitten should be taken to the vet for a health check. Depending on age, shots should be given for distemper and rabies, and the cat checked for FIV to confirm it is negative. Flea treatment, worming, elimination of ear mites are all things that need to be attended to. Having the animal neutered is the most responsible part of owning a pet. Does this still sound like a free kitten?

Veterinary fees can be costly. Heartland uses local vets just like everyone does. We do not have a vet on staff. We charge an adoption fee and have an application process. Some people will take the "free" cat to avoid the adoption fee. If their "free" cat is cared for properly it becomes evident that the fee charged by a shelter is less than what the free kitten is costing.

Most cats at shelters are there because of the owners – not because of something being wrong with the cat. They have been abandoned or are too much bother and expense for the owner to care for them any longer. All they want is a loving home, and Heartland works hard to match up families with cats that will add to the lives of both.


